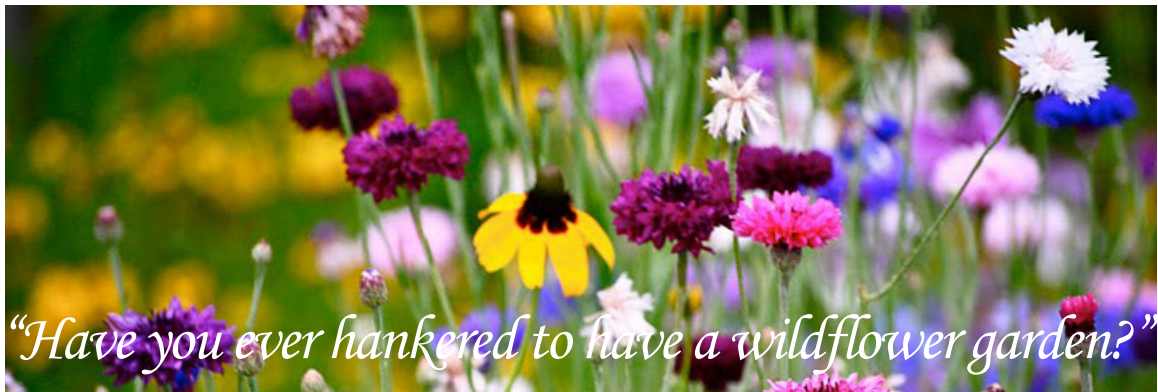


November 12, 2013



Would you like to have an English cottage garden without spending a small fortune on bedding plants each year? Our meeting on November 21st at the Garden Club will tell you how to do those things economically. After a brief explanation of the essentials for growing and saving the seed of wildflowers and many other old garden favorites, such as poppies, bachelor buttons, larkspur and cosmos, Lois McNamara and Begonia Circle members will provide a hands-on experience on how to “process” flower seeds. (You may wish to bring your gardening gloves.) Learn how to store the seeds and sow them. Envelopes and printed instructions will be provided so you can take whichever seeds you would like to have. There will be at least 14 kinds of flower seeds. Please note: November is a great time to sow the seeds for many of our Florida wildflowers and hardy annuals.

## Jasmine Circle Hosts Speaker Dr. Schoelhorn

On Thursday evening, October 24th, Jasmine Circle hosted the combined Gainesville Garden Club meeting. An excellent salad/desert supper was followed by guest speaker Dr. Rick Schoelhorn's presentation: Plant Now for Spring. Ellen Shapiro introduced Dr. Schoelhorn stating that over the past twenty years he has worked extensively in the horticulture holding a variety of positions in both higher education and business. Rick found his dream job with the Proven Winners team in 2005 as Director of New Products. He traveled the world to find new plants and tested them via Proven Winners exhaustive trial program helping plant breeders develop new crops. Dr. Rick Schoelhorn received his M.S. (1992) and Ph.D. (1996) from the University of Florida, Gainesville, and his B.S. from Colorado State University, in Fort Collins, in 1989. Dr. Schoelhorn is the co-author of *Your Florida Guide to Perennials* (ISBN: 0-8130-2927-9) with Dr. Sydney Park-Brown. Dr. Schoelhorn addressed the do's and don'ts of planting and landscape design keeping in mind advised dates for each micro-climate that we experience in Gainesville. An enthusiastic question and answer session followed. Attendees received 3 Proven Winners start up plants for growing this time of year.
